Series: 1 Samuel – In search of a King

Passage: 1 Samuel 16-17

Title: The King who saved his people

Introduction

- **★Week 1 Samuel** is raised up to rescue God's people.
- **★Week 2** even though God's people think God can be manipulated, both they and the Philistines learn that he is **King**, as they do **battle** with the ark of the **covenant**,
- **★Week 3** Israel **reject** God as **King**, as they want a **king** like all the **nations**. God gives them over to their desires and GIVES them a King!
- **★Week 4** Saul is anointed, elected and confirmed as King... God's doing entirely
- but ¥ last week almost immediately demonstrates his unworthiness for the role by not obeying God's specific commands as revealed through Samuel
- And now we turn this morning to chapter 17
- Three questions we're asking what is the passage about? What does it teach us about God? How does it teach us about Jesus?
- 1) **₩ WHAT IS THIS PASSAGE ABOUT?**
 - a. David anointed King 16:1-13
- ▼ You'll probably all remember the account from Sunday school days Samuel mourning for Saul because of God's rejection of him as king, – is now called on to go anoint another king!
- Samuel's tendency matches ours through and through we do it all the time don't we? i.e. judge by outward appearance. He saw Eliab, strapping eldest son of Jesse and thought he must be God's choice
- But the **Lord** said to **Samuel** 16:7 The Lord does not look at the things **people** look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." That is a great lesson for us in itself isn't it? To not make too many assumptions from someone's outward appearance!! //
- Well Jesse had seven of his sons parade in front of Samuel but one by one, the Lord told Samuel that it wasn't any of these he had chosen.
- 'Do you have any **MORE sons**?' asked Samuel?
- 'Well the youngest is out tending the sheep' as if to say surely you are not interested in HIM!
- The Lord said to Samuel 'rise and anoint HIM; he is the one.... And from that day on the Spirit of the Lord came upon **David** in **power**...
- And now look at 16:14 for as soon as we read the Spirit came upon David in power, we read that the Spirit of the Lord DEPARTED from Saul!...
- And so the transfer of God's anointing as King, God's blessing as King and God's empowering by His Spirit for the kingship, was now upon David!
- And in a sobering postscript we read that an evil or better 'harmful' spirit from the Lord tormented

Saul...

- Some have understood this as bouts of deep **depression**...
 - b. [Troubled Saul finds solace in David's music 16:12-23]
- **But whatever form it took, troubled Saul finds solace in David's music** and in an **ironic twist,** the **new** King becomes a music therapist to the old King... and whenever that spirit from the Lord hit, David (who had become an armour bearer in Saul's service) would take his harp and play (16:23) and Saul would feel much better.
 - c. A giant of a battle 17
- Ch 17 begins ominously: the Philistines gathered their forces for war.
- Israel had forgotten that God had faithfully delivered them from their enemies.
- Indeed, only when they abandoned him did their enemies gain the upper hand, as so often happened in the book of Judges and back in 1 Sam 4
- Then whenever they turned **back** to the Lord and cried out for **help**, he **delivered** them.
- the threat to Israel **posed** by this giant of a man is very **real**.
- The power that stood against the people of Israel was truly terrifying. It would be astounding if anyone could deliver Israel from this monstrous threat.
- Have a look with me at v11 On hearing the Philistine's words, Saul and all the Israelites were dismayed and terrified.
- You would be too!!
- We **too** know very real threats that could intimidate us.
- There are terrifying and spiritual forces against us, tempting us to fear.
- And yet, just has Hannah proclaimed back in Ch 2 that, "the adversaries of the LORD shall be broken to pieces", so too can we be confident, as Paul was in Romans 8:32, that "if God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him, graciously give us all things?" ///
- David comes on the scene. We're introduced to him once more. He tends his father's sheep but he loves to go the frontline with supplies from his father for his brothers.
- And as he's talking to his brothers... two words at the end of v23 grab our attention.
- David **heard**... he **heard**.
- David heard Goliath's now twice daily tirade.
- While Saul didn't appear to have any plan of attack against Goliath, David was indignant that Goliath should defy (or mock) the armies of the living God.
- He spoke of taking away the mockery from Israel, rather than being shattered by it.
- He saw, as no one else saw, that this uncircumcised Philistine, this pagan worshiper of dead gods, was mocking not only Israel, but Israel's God, who alone was the living God!
- The Spirit-filled young man named **David** saw Goliath **differently**.

- His brothers were unimpressed by the apparently presumptuous bravado, but word spread about what David was saying and it was not long before a report reached Saul.
- As the failed king met the king-elect, it is astonishing to see how David took charge of the meeting.
- V32 Let no one lose heart. Your servant will go and fight.
- Outrageous! Preposterous!
- These words came from a small, skinny youth, too young to leave home.
- For this kid to tell the king that he need not be afraid anymore because he (David) would fight the Philistine was either **stupid** or **audacious** or . . . was it something else?
- Do not be **afraid**. I will fight for you.
- We're reminded of these same words of the angels to the shepherds do not be afraid; the baby lying in a manger will save you from your enemies. CRAZY!
- Saul was incredulous.
- But David **defended** his claim on the basis of the way he defended his **sheep**.
- Ultimately David pointed to his strong and only hope v37 "the LORD who delivered me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine."
- David saw things this way, because he was the anointed one on whom the Spirit of the Lord had permanently come!
- As David and the Philistine eventually approached one another, Goliath only saw as man sees and was filled with contempt.
- Because God was with David, the disaster against a real threat in the form of a Giant did not happen.
- Because the Lord God had chosen a king for himself (16:1) on whom the Spirit of the Lord had powerfully come (16:13), it became clear that he was about to fight the Philistine (17:32).
- David came in the name of the Lord; the Philistine mocked the Lord; and consequently, he would be destroyed.
- With David's victory, the world would know who God is.... Have a look with me a v46 this day the LORD will hand you over to me and I'll strike you down and cut off your heard. Today I will give the carcasses of the Philistine army to the birds of the air and the beasts of the earth, and the whole world will know that there is a God in Israel....
- God's servant... God's battle... God's victory... ////
- 2) ▼ [What does it teach us about God?]
- We saw this in our first sermon as Samuel was raised up for THAT time in Israel's history.
- Now threatened once again by the Philistines and their great champion, God raises up a saviour for them in the **person** of **David**.
- And, furthermore,
 - b.

 God saves by unlikely means with a surprising weapon
- 'Why have you come here'? says his brothers to **David**...

- 'You're only a boy', says Saul. 'You're not able to go out and fight against this Philistine.'
- 'Am I a dog, that you come at with sticks?', says Goliath.
- The whole notion of sending a boy to fight a giant!
- How foolish! How absurd!
- But it only serves to prove that it is GOD who has raised up this saviour, God who has given him the courage and God who gave him the victory!
- As David said I come against you in the name of the **Lord Almighty**, the **God** of the **armies** of **Israel**, whom you have **defied**.... The **Lord** will hand you over to **me** and the **whole world** will know that there is a **God in** Israel!
- An unlikely **means** the **boy King David** the unlikely **weapon** a sling and a stone.
- God's battle God's victory.
- And the **final thing** we learn about **God**?
 - c. & God saves though his people don't deserve it
- They had rejected God has king the God who had so often rescued and saved them in the past...
- They wanted to be like all the nations around them
- Their first King was a sad failure...
- Now again as in the period of the judges... they were in the midst of another cycle of rebellion.
- They didn't deserve God's deliverance from the Philistine menace once again!
- But as we saw last week (12:22) for the sake of his great name the Lord will not reject his people, because the Lord was **pleased** to make [them] his **own**...
- So against **all** that they **deserve** the Lord **saved** them **through David**.
- So >>>>

3) **HOW DOES IT POINT US TO JESUS?**

- No doubt you can already see the **links**.
- It's as **profound** as it is **simple**.
- As we saw in our very first Samuel sermon, the God who had so often raised up a saviour, raised up our great Saviour Jesus.
- Galatians 4:4 when the time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under the law...
- You will call his name **Jesus** for he will save his people from their **sins**.
- **Behold** the lamb of **God** who takes away the **sin** of the **world**.
- Jesus was the one who came in the line of King David... who would save his people from sin and then take his **reign** as **King!**
- In **Jesus**, God **saves** by raising up a **Saviour**, and;

b. *God saves by unlikely means with a surprising weapon

- A young boy with a sling shot and a few small stones? •
- How absurd!
- A messiah on a cross? Even more absurd.
- Messiah crucified a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles!
- But nevertheless God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself and not counting men's sins against them... As astonishingly, God made him who had no sin to be sin for us... so that in him we might become the **righteousness** of **God**...
- An unlikely means yet God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe!
- And as with **David**, the **foolishness** of the **cross** only serves to demonstrate that it was **God's battle**, that it was all God's doing, and all God's victory...
- ♣And all for people who don't deserve it...
 - c. [God saves though his people don't deserve it]
- For because of his great love for us, God who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were **dead** due to **sin**...
- While we were still sinners, Christ died for us...
- all because of the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus...!
- I don't deserve what he has done. My back was turned, my heart was hard, my eyes were blind but he drew me to himself, softened my heart, opened my eyes...
- I was dead and he gave me life, guilty and he acquitted me...
- Because when he cried out on the cross 'it is finished' he had taken my sin, conquered death and opened the gates of heaven for me...

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CONCLUSION

- We look at the boy David armed with a sling shot and pebbles... and we are amazed at his bravery, astonished at the victory and in praise of the God who rescued Israel through David that day.
- 'awesome' is an overused word but it was an awesome rescue from an awesome God.
- But then then we look at the Lord Jesus God's own Son and we see him on the cross... and we are amazed and humbled by his obedience, astonished at the victory over sin and death he won for us and as we stand at the Garden, in front of the empty tomb with the stone rolled away – we are in praise of the God who rescued us that great day.
- It was an awesome rescue from an awesome God.
